But I still love and do play golf!

My beautiful wife of 46 years, Anita, and I moved her 5 years ago after living for 32 years in Atlanta to join our daughter Laura and husband Patrick when they moved here 7 years ago to become owners of the chick fila in Morehead City; they are also club members. We have a wonderful grandson Caleb, age 9, and granddaughter Reagan, age 6.

Polio initially paralyzed me and doctors said I would spend my life in a wheelchair but I beat all the odds and took my first steps a year later. I then played on both my high school and college golf teams. In later years I served as President of the Atlanta Post - Polio Association for 5 years, serving others like me dealing with the "after effects" of childhood polio. I served as Vice President of the 500 member Atlanta Advertising Club for several years, started and was President for of a group we named ORFUN, for Orphans Really Feel Us Now. We developed many programs over the years to make the lives a little better for orphans, foster and abandoned children. I also served years on the Board of the Men's Golf Association at Indian Hills Country Club in Atlanta. We ran both the Member-Member and Member-Guest Programs. The club had 27 holes and over 900 golfing members, so we had around 125 members playing in each tournament over 3 days. They were major events.

Professionally, I earned a BA in Accounting, followed by my MBA at the University of Illinois (my home state). I first worked in Marketing Consulting for Ernst & Whinney in Chicago, then moved to New York City for several years, first as a Marketing Manager for Sunshine Biscuits, then became the Marketing Director and AVP for a major division of Citicorp. 



Course begins with a medium length par 4 with a generous fairway. Tee shot to will need to land short of the pond located approximately 100 yards from the green. From the fairway you will have a direct shot to the green without having to challenge either of the bunkers guarding the left and right sides of the green. The 1st green is the old #2 green. Contouring has been softened, but approach shots will tend to filter to the left once on the green.

The 2nd hole is the old 5th hole. Those playing from the white & gold will find an expanded tee box to the left which allows players to run their ball onto the green. The green contour has been softened to allow more tee placements on the right portion of the green. The green has also been enlarged by up to 7 feet on the front left. The ledge towards the middle of the green will funnel shots to the left.

#3 Par 4	Black	Blue	White	Gold	Red

The 3rd hole is the old 6th hole. This short par 4 provides multiple options off of the tee. The widest part of the fairway is roughly 100 yards from the green. Those attempting to drive closer to the green will not have to challenge 2 fairway bunkers on the left. The green has been slightly enlarged and the lip on the front of the green has been removed allowing players a better opportunity to run their ball onto the green.

The 4th hole is the old 7th hole, the ultimate in risk reward hole. Expect #4 to play a variety of distances, as the tee box is nearly 100 yards in length. Trees have been removed and the fairway has been extended 15 yards to the left around the pond. A new waste area has been added to the left of the fairway. Challenge the pond off the tee and leave yourself an easier second shot. Play safe off the tee and you'll need to hit an accurate approach to avoid the pond.

This long and challenging par 5 will play into the prevailing wind. The 5th is the old 3rd hole. Tee shots will need to avoid a new fairway bunker on the left. The old waste bunker is in the process of being grassed. 2 additional fairway bunkers have been placed short and to the right of the green. A newelevated green has been located approximately 60 yards further back than the old 3rd green.

The 6th hole is the old 4th hole. Changes include a new back tee. The pond has been extended slightly closer to the tee. The fairway has been widened around the pond. The 7th hole is the old 8th hole. The easiest par 5 before the renovation now becomes arguably the most challenging par 4 of the new course. The fairway has been widened by nearly 30 yards. Tee shots will need to avoid a large fairway bunker on the right. Greenside bunkers have been repositioned to allow balls to roll up onto the green.

The 8th is the old 9th. New tees and a new green make this hole play as an entirely new hole. The fairway has been elevated and is generous in the landing area. Approach shots must be precise as this green has some of the largest contours you'll find on the course. Make sure to not be above the hole when the flag is on the front.

The 9th is a new picturesque par 3. The entire hole runs along the marsh of the Newport River. The prevailing wind will be into the players and blowing towards the river. The green is setup for players to be able to run their ball onto the middle or right side of the green. Once the ball is on the green players will find the ball will want to release to the left. Those attempting to hit a shot close when the flag is positioned on the left players will be forced to challenge the pond.

Green contours have been softened. The 13th should play slightly easier for shorter hitters than before and possibly harder for the longer hitters.

14th hole is the old 15th. A new back tee stretches this par 3 to nearly 200 yards. The front left bunker has been reduced in size by nearly 50%. The back right bunker has been removed. #15 is old #16. Much like #13 new #15 should play slightly easier for shorter hitters and slightly harder for longer hitters. A bunker has been positioned to shrink the bailout to the left of the green. Contours on the back of the green have been softened, allowing a number of new pin positions.

Saving the best for last! MCCC's signature hole becomes even more of a risk reward finish. Those going for the green in 2 will cut off nearly 50 yards from the scorecard yardage. Ideally even if players are not going for the green in 2 they will want to clear the marsh in 2 shots. The further to the right of the green you go the shorter the carry is over the marsh. Those choosing to lay up short of the marsh will only be able to see half of the green. The 18th green is a large green sloping from back to front and right to left. The green is not only guarded by the marsh, but the largest bunker on the course.

Randy Wilson brings over 27 years of golf course design and
construction experience. Having worked with Jack Nicklaus, Tom

First thoughts on seeing Morehead City Country Club?

Before visiting I knew the club had a very strong membership. As strong a membership as you'll see for an 18 hole facility. I also knew there were some really great views of the Newport River. I'll have to say the first time seeing the course I felt the club had a tremendous opportunity to improve and maximize views of the Newport River. I spent several hours surveying the course before meeting with Nick Eatmon. Within just a few minutes I knew Nick and I would be on the same page with the project. We had very similar thoughts on what to do with the property, specifically the area around the 18th green. By moving the 18th green closer to the water and making a new par 3 9th hole on the water you not only create a more dynamic and memorable course you also provide a spot for the new clubhouse. A clubhouse that will have views of the 9th and 18th greens along with views of the Newport River. This is a special opportunity to maximize the clubs million dollar views. You just don't come across property like this.

How do you plan on ensuring all levels of play will enjoy playing MCCC? Three keys for any renovation is to maximize playability, maintainability and aesthetes. Our first goal is to ensure the course is player friendly for the senior membership. With an average age of membership over 60 we want to make the course more playable off the tee and into the greens. Bunkers will have lower leading edges and will allow easier egress and ingress. This creates a more classic look, much like a Donald Ross design. At the same time this helps with ease of maintenance. Morehead City Country Club in the past utilized 5 sets of tees measuring approximately from 4,000 yards to approximately 6,350. We will have 6 sets of tees measuring from under 4,000 yards up to approximately 6,800 yards. When playing the appropriate set of tees all players from the youth, seniors and scratch players will enjoy the course. The goal of tee placement is for a variety of players who hit tee shots from 100 yards to over 250 to all have the same club when hitting into greens. By incorporating Tifeagle greens the course will experience more consistent green speeds throughout the year. Members can expect greens will roll consistently 11 to 12 on the stimpmeter. In accordance we plan to soften some of the contours of the current greens for more pinable areas. Greens will be enlarged to original sizes. Greens in some instances have encroached 7 to 8 feet since being built in 1998. We are confident Morehead City Country Club will be the type of course that will challenge players, but will also be a lot of fun to play.

Why Tifeagle Bermuda greens? Bentgrass struggles in warm climates. Tifeage bermudagreens are at their peak in the busy season. We have renovated a number of courses with Tifeage throughout the eastern United States. We understand Morehead City Country Club has been known for superior bentgrass greens. Tifeagle will meet the standard members expect.

Thoughts on bunker design? Willy Toms and his staff have been dealt an almost impossible challenge in maintaining bunkers. Bunkers have had raised edges where you can not keep a consistent amount of sand throughout the bunker. The bunkers were retaining water because of poor drainage. The bunkers are now renovated with a superior drainage system provided by Atlantic Installations, a superior bunker floor design and have vastly improved bunker sand. The membership will love the playability and Willy's job in maintaining consistency has been made much easier and much more cost effective.

You mentioned bunker sand. Can you tell us more? The sand chosen is comparable to the sand at Augusta National. The mine the sand comes from is 30 miles outside of Augusta, Ga. It's crushed quartz, very consistent, firm and will be much easier to hit from. The chance of fried egg lies in this sand is greatly reduced. This sand is extremely white as you will see in the before and after pictures.

Thoughts on the new driving range and practice facility?

By moving the range the club has the ability to have over an acre of natural turf teeing space. One of the limitations of the current range is the inability to use the grass tee. This will not be a problem moving forward. There will be multiple short game areas. The current chipping area will remain similar, but another short game area has been added by using the current 1st green located on the back of the range. The back of the range will also have an additional tee. The back of the range can be used for those just wanting to get away from the crowd or can be used for clinics. It will be a great area for the high school teams to use while keeping the primary tee for member use. The putting green will be enlarged to 8,000 plus square feet and relocated to be close to the driving range tee and first tee. This will be a state of the art practice facility, one of the best in eastern North Carolina.

Members are talking a lot about the new 9th hole and 18th green. However, you speak highly of the new 16th hole.

As mentioned earlier the 9th and 18th greens open up views as good as you'll find anywhere. But the new 16th hole is going to be a spectacular par 3 with what potentially could be the best view. The hole will be built to maximize panoramic views of the Newport River and future clubhouse. There are not many courses that will be able to match the finish Morehead City Country Club will have with the 16th, 17th & 18th holes. Curtis has spoke very highly of the renovation, specifically 9 & 18. Curtis feels those bookend finishing holes are as good as you'll find anywhere.

Speaking of Curtis, how has working with Curtis been? It has been an enjoyable experience getting to know Curtis. His thoughts on shot values for our new holes has added to the design. Relying on his years of playing some of the great courses around the world is a huge asset.

What can the membership expect in 2018 with course

maturation? We will have to continually tweak the course after play has resumed and get feedback from membership as to how the course is playing. The course will require one more summer growing season to get the fairways in the shape the members are accustomed to. Native grass areas will continue to develop over the following year. Normally it takes two full growing seasons to establish native areas.

Operations Report by Nick Eatmon

The growth of your club over the past few years has been phenomenal. This is an exciting time to be a member as the club is transforming from a golf club to a country club. Your support and patience during this phase of renovation has been tremendous and greatly appreciated. At any point if you have questions with club operations please let me know.

The board of directors and staff came to the realization of the following.

- Course conditions will continue to deteriorate due to time since last renovation. Especially noticeable with greens and bunkers.
- Current clubhouse is serviceable, but is not the clubhouse of the future. This can be said for the pool as well.
- Financially the leaders of the club are responsible for spending money wisely. It has been deemed saving money while paying 39% of profits to tax is irresponsible towards maximizing the clubs potential.
- Interest rates and building prices will continue to rise in the coming years.

MCCC has been a successful club since the early 2000's. However, a gradual loss of membership and the lack of younger families joining the club put the club in a precarious position moving forward. In early 2014 the club dropped to approximately 540 members with average age nearing 65. Granted most clubs would love to have 540 members. However, the club had dropped from 660 members in 2009.

In 2014 a goal was set to increase value through all areas of membership. A number of food & beverage activities were added. In golf operations additional events were added along with \$3 cart fees after 3:00. These simple steps became essentially phase 1 in improvements. These steps saw food and beverage sales double by 2016 while increasing the membership back to 660. Average age of membership dropped on average 1 year for each year from 2014-2016.

Food & beverage grew faster than anyone could of expected, but rounds of golf continued to fall. In fiscal year 2015-2016 rounds of golf fell to just below 28,000 18-hole equivalents. Down over 10,000 rounds from 10 years prior. This was with more members! To increase rounds there needed to be improved playing conditions while maximizing the clubs land and what a piece of land MCCC has!

Priority #1 is to increase the value of everyone's membership. With this in mind I began mapping a plan to take the club into the future towards the later part of 2014. A plan was put into place by looking at national country club trends and realizing our own change in culture. To meet the needs of our current membership and to entice perspective members it became evident the club would need to look into an improved clubhouse and pool facility. At the same time the golf course would need to be the first step in improvements. By rerouting the course the club would have the ability to relocate new facilities in the future.

The hardest part of the project has been taking a course everyone loves, including myself and in some cases making drastic changes. Please take note the goals for the course renovation have been simple. First and foremost we did not want to take the enjoyment of playing the course away. Meaning MCCC's has always had great features which include the course is fun to play, you can play fast and the course lends itself well to walking. Those aspects have not changed. The course will be fun to play for all skill levels with tee lengths of 6,800 yards all the way to less than 4,000 yards. The routing lends itself to continue fast play and to walking. I sincerely hope once you get a chance to play the course you'll sit back and say this is how the course should of always played. In fact I'm confident you'll love the layout!

The new layout allows the club to build a clubhouse between the 9th & 18th holes while being located on the Newport River. The clubhouse will have additional views of the 8th, 16th and tee shots on #10. The space provided by the rerouting also allows for parking lot of approximately 200 spaces.

Since the middle of July the clubs membership has grown to 840. Average age of membership is now under 60 years of age! Today the club is as strong as any country club you will find!



When is projected opening date? Friday, October 20th

Will we have problems getting tee times? The club has reached a high of 840 members. There are understandable concerns with the numbers being much higher than at any point in club history. Ideally the club would range between 35,000 and 40,000 18-hole rounds played per year. This would be the same amount of rounds played from 2005 through 2008. As a comparison 2016-2017 the club played 28,000 while reaching a high of 657 members. Out of the 180 new members 146 of the new members were either families under the age of 40 or nonresident members. History has shown these 2 categories play less than 15, 18-hole rounds a year. If history holds true the 180 new members and their guest will play less than 4,000 rounds a year. This would increase rounds to 32,000. It is expected the new course will generate increased rounds, but rounds are still expected to be at a manageable number under 40,000.

FAQ continued How has the renovation gone to this point? The transformation of the course has been tremendous. Bunkers and green structures are every bit and more of what was expected. With the end of the bermuda grass growing season approaching #1 fairway, parts of #7, #8, #10 & #11 fairways have been seeded with rye to ensure good playing conditions from October through April. These fairways will need warm weather in May and June to completely cover over. Some have expressed concerns with potentially opening too early. Keep in mind when temperatures at night drop below 60 degrees growth for bermuda grass slows or stops. By October 20th average night temperatures drop to 55 degrees. Meaning to not expect more fairway growth until the middle of May. Rye grass will keep sprigged fairways in great shape to that point. In fact during the Masters golf tournament the pros are playing on overseeded rye on top of bermuda fairways. Greens are coming along nicely, but there are concerns with the back portions of #11 along with small areas on #15 and #17. With warm weather all the greens will be excellent condition by October 20th. A number of out of play areas have been seeded with weeping love grass, fescue and or wild flowers. These areas will not be fully grown in by October 20th. Fescue will continue to grow through the winter, but love grass and wild flowers will need another growing season to be in desired condition. To reach optimal conditions the course will need to go through potentially another full growing season.

What is the status on the new pool? Original projections forecasted a pool opening last summer. Early on in the project a summer opening became a long shot due to permitting. Permitting pushed the project back to where it was decided to delay opening until spring of 2018. A start date has not been determined, however an ideal start date would be late 2017 or early 2018.

When will construction of the new clubhouse begin? A date for beginning the clubhouse has yet to be determined. However, a potential timeframe is becoming more in focus. First step in building the clubhouse is to make sure the clubhouse can be built safely within the clubs cash flow. The Board of Directors hired Doug Spear as an outside consultant to run a feasibility study for the clubhouse. Mr. Spear has over 35 years of experience and came to the club highly recommended. His study showed a clubhouse of approximately 15,000 square feet in the same style as shown to the right. Mr. Spear used the clubs last 3-year financial statements along with projecting income in the future. Mr. Spear stated the club does not have to gain 1 member or make a single extra dollar off the new clubhouse and the club can pay for the new clubhouse. In his estimation he feels as if the clubhouse will stand on it's own with the money brought in from events. He noted Coral Bay and Dunes Club as local example of successful social clubs. Since Mr. Spear began work conducting the feasibility study the club gained 180 new members in a period of 6 weeks. Mr. Spear took notice saying, "In all his years of consulting he has not seen a club or heard of a club anywhere in the nation having such a jump in membership." With Mr. Spears study in hand President Ron Perry, Soundbank representative Richard McIntyre and myself met with the United States Department of Agriculture and Doug Spear to see where the club would stand in regards to gaining a government backed loan by the USDA. A government-backed loan would allow the club to gain a 30-year loan instead of 20 and would lower interest rates to be prime plus a small percent. The importance in gaining this backing is immense. Gaining a 30-year loan would allow the club to set a depreciation schedule much closer to actual depreciation while keeping monthly payments lower than a standard 20 year business loan. The USDA encouraged the club to move forward with the project by hiring an architect for construction drawings and to gain price for construction. The USDA recommended having these prices in their fiscal year 2017-2018 (October through September). Once prices are secure the club can find their contractor of choices schedule you can expect ground to break. Without hold ups the club could potentially break ground towards the end of 2018.

What can you tell us about the new clubhouse layout? Maximizing views while ensuring membership needs is the priority. Conceptually the new clubhouse base level will sit approximately 12 feet above see level. This is slightly higher than the back mound of the old 18th green. This elevation will be done primarily through landscaping. At this height even the first floor will be looking down on the 9th & 18th greens. The first level will have the pro shop, bar/restaurant, kitchen, men and women's locker room/sitting areas. The second floor conceptually will have the ability to seat 400 in the banquet room. Outdoor spaces will be utilized by having wraparound porches and a roof top area will allow views of 8,9,10,16 & 18.



Food & beverage is busier than ever, will the club be hiring additional help? August was the busiest August on record for food & beverage. Notably Wednesday dinners have been tremendous. Staffing changes left the club shorthanded until recently. Three great hires have been made in recent months. Additionally Jenn is speaking with potential hires. Food & beverage is in good hands moving forward. A number of events will be held from here out and we are asking you to sign up for events as soon as possible. This include Wednesday night dinners. With increased activity the club has a reservation system and by walking in you are taking the chance of meals being sold out.

Will the new pool have lifeguards and will food and drinks be served at the pool? We plan on having pool attendants/lifeguards available during prime hours. Those hours are yet to be determined, but an example will be 10 to 8. Servers will be available working the pool bar. Having full service pool areas is a new aspect for the club. The new pool area will be the best in Carteret County, expect the unexpected! There will be a number of exciting events for the entire family! What better place will there be to hang out in Morehead City? Relax with seating in the pool or by the bar. Watch your favorite sporting event at the outside bar or simply watch golfers on the new par 3 9th hole. Which will arguably be the most scenic and best par 3's in the state! Lastly you will be able to enjoy scenic sunsets on the Newport River.



Will there be lessons/clinics for juniors, women or beginners in the near future? We're jumping head first into an exciting new program called Operation 36. Operation 36 is perfect for juniors, women and beginners. Operation 36 is designed to track performance of all levels while giving those players achievable goals. 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Golf Course Maintenance ~ Willy Toms

The Golf Maintenance staff is excited about opening the course very soon. Our practice facilities are open and in good shape. We will be overseeded the driving range tee with ryegrass at the begining of October (this means we will have to keep it wet to germinate the seed for about 10 days). The greens on the course are coming along nicely and will be in good shape for opening. The fairways that have been sprigged are still thin, so to get a better playing surface we have overseeded these areas with ryegrass. It may take another growning season for these sprigged fairways and native areas to be completely grown in. The bunkers are in great shape, Randy's crew softened the lips, grassed the faces, added drainage and replaced all the sand. With several eye popping new holes added and great views of the Newport River, we are all excited to see everyone in a few weeks.
